What does Balance mean to you in your work (balance is our conference theme)?

Balance is about understanding all of the options, impacts, opinions and considerations - considering them, and working towards an end result that meets as many as possible. Critical to this is ensuring all of the voices are heard- the people are at the table. A key role of the landscape architect on a project team is to hear from the scientists (technical experts) the other designers (architects, engineers) and the people (residents, users, special interest groups) and somehow mash that all together into a design that tries to meet the needs of everyone. Balance means to do the best job of designing to all of those different and sometimes conflicting inputs. Balance is always about putting ego or predetermined ideas aside, and actively listening. At the end of the day, it's amazing if we can meet everyone's goals and needs, but if we can't at least we will have done our best to mitigate the worst and amplified the benefits.

What's something you wish you knew/understood better when you started your career?

Something that I was never taught in school but has been a major influencing factor in my career that I wish I knew about before I started, was how much politics plays into what gets built, what gets funding, how projects proceed. In school, we are all encouraged to design in Utopia, where the best design is one that fixes the problem at hand. But what is left out is why that is the problem to solve – why is that project being funded? I have learned so much about this process in my time as a municipal landscape architect, and there are so many factors – what grants are available and what are the criteria for eligible projects? What pots of money can the city collect, and how is it able to be spent? What are the priorities of the council term, and what projects are prioritized because of those? If you want to know more about why certain projects are happening across the province, you should start with where is the money coming from.... Often you will find political support for that project, one way or another. I co-wrote an article about this in a recent issue of Ground Magazine, outlining the role of the municipal landscape architect in understanding funding sources, policies, and planning.
